Story telling

Learning Objective:

Children will engage in storytelling activities to foster creativity, language expression, and social skills by creating and sharing their own versions of the "Goldilocks and the Three Bears" story.

Learning Outcomes:

Children will demonstrate creativity by using puppets, props, or drawings to retell the "Goldilocks and the Three Bears" story in their own words.

Children will enhance their language expression skills by narrating and describing story elements such as characters, settings, and events.

Children will practice turn-taking and active listening as they share their stories with the group and listen to their peers' interpretations.

Children will develop an appreciation for storytelling as a form of self-expression and communication.

Sample Storytelling Activity with "Goldilocks and the Three Bears":

Title: "Goldilocks' Adventure"

Description:

In this storytelling activity, children will have the opportunity to create and share their own versions of the classic tale "Goldilocks and the Three Bears" using puppets, props, or drawings.

stories.

Through this storytelling activity, children will have the opportunity to unleash their creativity, enhance their language skills, and develop important social and communication skills in a fun and engaging way.
